## Team Ocean Kayak place 4th in IFA Port Aransas, TX

Team Ocean Kayak's Captain Filip Spencer placed 4th overall in the first IFA event of the year held in Port Aransas, Texas. The weather was miserable, winds in excess of 30 mph made for a tough day of fishing. Team mates Vincent Rinando and Clint Barghi both had opportunities to cash in on first place, but lost the battle with the winning fish. Cameron Barghi 11th Place, Clint Barghi 16th Place, and Vincent Rinando 17th Place.

### Vincent's tournament Recap:

Tournament fishing is always humbling. This past weekend was no exception. It's never the titles or the trophies that you remember, it's always the one that got away that sticks in your mind. For the past year, I've been telling my friends that I couldn't wait for the IFA to start in 2012. Last year 2 days before the opening event I was in a bad car wreck that left me with a fractured pelvis and many weeks of rehab. Eager to start the year off right, I travelled to Corpus Christi on Thursday to get a head start on pre fishing. Winds in excess of 25mph all week made for some miserable fishing. Pre fishing Friday and Saturday did nothing more than eliminate 5 bad spots, where fish had been, but moved when the winds picked up. Sunday was brutal, started off the day crossing a deep boat channel that at 6:30am didn't look too menacing. Unfortunately the tide was ripping out and the winds were blowing in at more than 25mph and there were some nasty 4-5 curling surf waves dead center of the channel. I pointed towards the first big wave headed my way as I was paddling perpendicular to the channel. When the wave hit me, it spun me 90 degrees and I was now facing straight down the channel. The second wave picked me up and started to surf me down the face of the wave. I leaned out and performed a brace, which allowed the wave to slip under the kayak and let go of me. Just then wave number three hit me in the back and crested over the deck of my kayak. I think had I not been bracing, it would have knocked me out of the kayak. I made two hard sweep strokes and was able to get my bow facing back into the swell and push myself over the next wave before it crest and a few more strokes and I was out of the current and the waves. Heart racing, I was sure I was going to turtle in 30 foot of water in a heavy current, waves, and strong wind, not a good combination. We made it into our first area and Fil hooks a keeper trout in the first cast. I caught a few dink trout before the winds increased by more than 10 mph to well over 30mph. White caps were forming under the mangrove bushes and extended from shoreline to shoreline. I tied my kayak to me and started wading down wind dragging an anchor to slow the kayak. I get a small pop on a topwater and as the fish swims past me I see it's a nice upper slot redfish around 26-27" long. I let it run out a bit into the lake to get it off the shoreline and turn it back to make the landing when it pulls back and comes unhooked. Dejected, I wasn't too worried, it was only 8am and I had plenty of time. No more than 10 casts later Fil gets a blowup on his topwater and I make a cast just beyond his lure and it gets inhaled by a fish. As I sit back on the hook, the fish comes to the surface and headshakes for about 5 seconds. My heart sunk, it was a BIG trout, for Port Aransas anyways, well over 5lbs and 25-27" long at least. It stops the head shakes and decides to jump straight into the air. This fish is in about 6" of water and right on top of a shell pad. It makes a thrash in the water, then makes another monster jump and does a complete flip, I still haven't seen my top water, that's a good sign. It head shakes again and decides to make another big jump. Still on I decided to put some pressure on this fish and make it do something other than jump and headshake. As it swims past Fil and I, neither one of us can see the top water, so I'm thinking it's buried in this fish's throat. I decided to jump out of the kayak and land this fish on my feet considering what happened to the redfish a few casts earlier. The fish makes a big run, I turn her back towards me and start her towards the net. I get her less than 5 feet from the net when the unthinkable happens. I felt the 50lb braid cut and the line go limp. Without thinking I drop my rod and make a dive for the fish, no such luck, came up empty, and now had to fish around on the bottom to find my rod. I rig back up and try and contemplate what has just happened. Did I just loose 52+ and \$2500.00 in about 10 casts? That's hard to shake, and with my brain shut down about 10 minutes later I didn't look back for my kayak and made a cast that hung one of the rods in my seat rod holder. It wasn't good, I broke the tip off one rod and stripped 4 guides off the other rod. Destroyed two high end bait casters in one cast. I was able to try and fish with one of them...did manage a 18" trout, but the braid in that wind kept wrapping around the rod and hanging on the broken posts. I finished the day throwing a topwater with a 7'3" medium heavy spin rod in a 30mph wind. I found and hooked the winning fish, but fate decided it wasn't in the cards. It's going to take a while for the sting of this tournament to go away....but it will....Vincent

Big winners for the weekend were the Ocean Kayak Frenzy, Tetra and Trident. Great low prices on the Frenzy drove sales of that model into the double digits.


The weather was great and the crowds were strong on both days. This event is held at the San Marcos Ski Ranch, located off I35 between Austin and San Antonio.
